

Director's Report


What a great year! 2019 has seen both challenges and achievements for the public libraries in Jefferson County. We're excited to be witness to the value the community sees in public libraries through a new library in Center Point and expressions of interest in establishing libraries in other areas. We are also acutely aware of the financial challenges that our libraries face through declining budgets or rising membership fees required to deliver services. The expressions of support for Walter J Hanna Memorial Library at Fairfield were powerful and moving. The idea of a library partnership born 40 years ago still bears fruit, and the public libraries are stronger and more vibrant through collaboration. Like all living systems, the library cooperative needs care and feeding. You'll see some of the steps we've taken to support the cooperative in this report, others such as investing in remote collaboration tools, migration to new email and productivity services, and leveraging opportunities from the Alabama Legislature are less apparent. The library cooperative exists to strengthen the public libraries in Jefferson County, and with your support we will work through 2020 and beyond to deliver on that mission.

NEW GROWTH

Downloadable ebooks and audiobooks on OverDrive continue to be very popular resources. Usage of our OverDrive collection has seen an astounding **28% growth** from 2018 to 2019. If you haven't experienced this service yet, look for **Libby** on the web or in your app marketplace.



Goal: We're working to prioritize existing funding and identify new funding sources to grow this resource to meet demand. We've taken steps to facilitate expanded library participation in the program by investing in their ability to exercise local control of digital material.

NEW PARTNERSHIPS

With the **Library + School Partnership**, participating schools can enable direct access to library materials for their students using school IDs.

We've already added three public school systems and are looking for more partners. Ask about the **Sora Starter Kit** as a no-cost option for schools to get started.

Goal: The libraries seek to demonstrate that resource sharing and interorganizational collaboration are cost-efficient and add value, particularly in the context of digital material collections.





NEW SERVICES

Our public libraries are creators and innovators. We've been working collaboratively with a major software vendor to develop **Inspire Discovery**, a next-generation library discovery catalog. Where Inspire Discovery diverges from the library catalog you are used to is in the technology used to define the library


materials. By adopting the technologies that are prevalent in our homes, schools and businesses, library information can be integrated more easily into those services.



Goal: The library is a critical community resource for information discovery and knowledge creation at all stages of life. Our goal is to help you utilize library resources wherever you are whenever you need them.

NEW HORIZONS

The traditional measure of library use is the count of items that are checked out. From 2018 to 2019 we've seen an **18% increase** in library usage and are at a **5-year high**.
